Madonna's Omaha Campus—a new era in rehabilitation

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On Sept. 29, 2016, Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals opened its doors in Omaha, ushering in a new era of individualized, inpatient rehabilitation. Staff, former patients and community partners gathered to celebrate the milestone.

The state-of-the-art facility allows Madonna to serve a greater number of adults and children who have sustained brain injuries, spinal cord injuries, stroke, neurological diseases and pulmonary conditions. Located just west of Village Pointe Shopping Center, the 260,000-square-foot Omaha Campus has 110-private patient rooms and includes three major areas—an acute rehabilitation hospital with a dedicated children's rehabilitation unit and a rehabilitation specialty hospital.

The Madonna Institute of Rehabilitation Science and Engineering is on site and collaborates with university researchers, clinicians, scientists and industry business leaders in Omaha and across the country in developing new technology.

Similar to the Lincoln Campus, the hospital includes a main therapy gym, a warm-water pool, a chapel and Independence Square—a simulated community for patients to practice daily independent living skills, such as driving, laundry and grocery shopping.

A partnership with the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and its primary clinical partner, Nebraska Medicine, is providing physician support for adult patients. Samuel Bierner, M.D., is leading the effort with more than 25 years of experience in the specialty of physical medicine and rehabilitation (PM&R). Madonna and UNMC are also establishing and supporting the PM&R department which will include a residency program. The program is the first of its kind in the region. Medical students and residents will train at Madonna's Omaha campus. In addition, Children's Hospital & Medical Center is providing specialty physician medical services for Madonna's pediatric unit.

The journey to Omaha began with a vision fueled by an unwavering commitment to our mission. Madonna is changing the face of rehabilitation by investing in exceptional and compassionate talent, groundbreaking technology and progressive treatment.



ON-SITE TEAM NURSE LIAISONS

We believe that rehabilitation starts in the acute care hospital. At Madonna, we have a team of 11 nurses liaisons living in communities around the Midwest. These nurses are committed to talking with each of our prospective patients about the importance of making a good decision and what to look for when choosing a rehabilitation hospital. A nurse liaison is a registered nurse who coordinates pre-admission assessments for potential patients to our programs.

NET REVENUE

Madonna is pleased to report another successful financial year with net operating revenues reaching \$119,366,337, an 8.8 percent increase from last year. Total assets reached \$243,793,814, a \$16 million increase.

ADMISSIONS FROM THE REGION

- 58 percent of patients admitted to Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital were from out of state/regional.
- 52 percent of patients admitted to Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty Hospital-Lincoln were from out-of-state/regional.
- 75 percent of patients admitted to Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty Hospital-Bellevue were from the Omaha metro; 25 percent were from the region.

Wichita man's recovery fosters attitude of gratitude

John Cummings has one word for his recovery journey: life-changing. On Jan. 2, 2016, John was removing Christmas lights from his house when the ladder slipped and he plunged 12 feet to the concrete. John's wife, Cindy, and a neighbor found him unresponsive and called 911. John was rushed to Wesley Medical Center in his hometown of Wichita, Kansas, where surgeons fused the fractured L1 vertebrae in his lower back.

Two weeks later, John arrived at Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty Hospital-Lincoln, weak and unable to walk. Nerve damage caused excruciating leg pain. John's nursing team gradually weaned him off the pain medication. "I immediately felt better," said John, who was determined to regain his mobility. "From day one, my main goal was to leave walking."

A successful business owner and devoted family man with three children, John's upbeat attitude influenced his outcomes. "I believe positive thinking makes good things happen."

Once he grew stronger, John transitioned to Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital-Lincoln and began his intense,

specialized program. He discovered the therapy gym was a source of inspiration and newfound friends. "I met patients with far worse injuries, all working so hard," said John. "We bonded through encouraging each other and sharing experiences."

Competitive by nature, John continually pushed himself. "If my therapist said to do 20 repetitions, I'd do 25," he joked. The Ekso™, a bionic suit, improved his balance and leg muscles. A major turning point came when John first stood independently. "It boosted my confidence that I could return to work."


The loving support of John's family and friends lifted his spirits and kept him focused on his goals. Within three months, John walked out the doors of Madonna using a cane. He's returned to work and an active family life. John continues to finesse his gait through outpatient therapy in Wichita.

Reflecting on the accident, John says, "life-changing is a good word." The grateful Kansan credits his successful recovery to a combination of advanced technology and his Madonna team. "It's hard to imagine getting that level of care anywhere else."




MADONNA REHABILITATION HOSPITAL (MRH-L)

Eighty-three percent of patients served had neurologically impaired diagnoses such as stroke, brain injury and spinal cord injury. Seventy-two percent of MRH-L patients discharge to a community setting (exceeds national average.) Of the 670 patients cared for by MRH-L, 99 (15 percent) were children.




MADONNA REHABILITATION SPECIALTY HOSPITAL-LINCOLN (MRSH-L)

Sixty-two percent of patients served had complex medical or pulmonary conditions. MRSH-L discharged 27 percent of patients directly to a community setting with 18 percent discharged to an acute rehabilitation hospital on their journey back to the community.



MADONNA REHABILITATION SPECIALTY HOSPITAL-BELLEVUE (MRSH-B)

Seventy-seven percent of patients served had complex medical or pulmonary conditions. MRSH-B discharged 32 percent of patients directly to a community setting with 9 percent discharged to an acute rehabilitation hospital on their journey back to the community.



LONG-TERM OUTCOMES

Madonna staff contacted 244 individuals by telephone to track patient gains six months to one year after discharge to the community from Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals.

- 99.6 percent were still living in a community setting.
- 98.3 percent reported being actively involved in some form of ongoing exercise or wellness activity.

Outdoor enthusiast resumes active life after spinal cord injury

Lloyd Kalfs isn't letting a spinal cord injury limit his enthusiasm for life and communing with Mother Nature.

Growing up on a farm in Okabena, Minnesota, Lloyd developed his love for the great outdoors. In addition to working in the fields, he learned to fish, hunt and trap. "I grew to appreciate wildlife and nature," said Lloyd.

Those passions heavily influenced his decision to pursue a degree in natural resources. "I chose a career where I could ensure future generations had similar opportunities," said Lloyd, a graduate of Northland College in Ashland, Wisconsin.

Three years later, the outdoorsman found his idyllic world upended. On June 15, 2013, Lloyd was involved in a single car roll-over crash less than a mile from his home. Days later, he woke up in Sanford Hospital in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, with no recollection of the crash.

Doctors discovered Lloyd's heart would periodically stop beating for 30 to 60 seconds and likely contributed to his accident. Lloyd's extensive injuries included a C6-C7 spinal cord injury. Surgeons realigned his spine and installed a pacemaker to regulate the young man's erratic heartbeat.

Lloyd arrived on July 8 at Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty

Hospital-Lincoln. He couldn't breathe or eat on his own and was paralyzed from the chest down. He overcame pneumonia, urinary tract infections and endured another painful neck surgery. On July 31, with the introduction of a Passy Muir® valve, Lloyd spoke his first words.

During five months of rehabilitation, Lloyd celebrated many successes, including weaning from the ventilator, eating a regular diet and mastering his sip and puff power wheelchair.

When he returned home, Lloyd made additional gains in a year of outpatient therapy. Living independently in his own home is rewarding. Everyday tasks others may take for granted, like running a cell phone or computer, empower Lloyd.

His game changer is an Action Trackchair® purchased last year after a fundraiser sponsored by the high school girls basketball team he helps coach. "I can easily traverse on any terrain and hunt with my buddies," said Lloyd, who counts deer, pheasant, turkey and a bear, among his trophies. Standing upright is an incredible feeling for the 6-foot-7-inch tall hunter.

Lloyd's persistence to embrace life is admirable. "Although life may be different, it doesn't mean that different cannot be great. It doesn't mean that different can't be amazing!"

Madonna gives back to the community

Madonna's mission and values are evident every day in the hospitals' daily activities and in the ways the organization gives back to the community.

CHARITY CARE

Services provided to patients unable to pay for health care totaled \$1,359,488 in the 2016 fiscal year. Madonna provided two avenues for patients to qualify for free or reduced-cost services: charity care based on patient income level and St. Benedict funds set aside by the Madonna Foundation to assist patients and families in crisis.

SUBSIDIZED HEALTH SERVICES

Madonna absorbed \$3,894,548 in losses due to shortfalls between patient care costs and the amounts paid by Medicare for the Transitional Care Unit (TCU) and outpatient services.

EDUCATION

Madonna's workforce shares the latest research and best practices for rehabilitation. In fiscal year 2015-2016:

- More than 50 employees made local, regional, national and international presentations on Madonna's behalf.
- Madonna employees gave over 150 presentations in 17 states and 4 countries including Canada, Taiwan and Switzerland.

COMMUNITY MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION

Because people with disabilities and the elderly have increased health care needs, isolation from providers can have a profound impact on the quality of their life, health and safety. Madonna's Community Medical Transportation Program allows individuals to get the timely medical care they need, decreasing the number of situations that could result in emergency room trips and increased costs.

ADAPTIVE SPORTS

Madonna's Adaptive Sports and Recreation program served 786 individuals, including 143 patients and 643 community members with disabilities, in fiscal year 2016.

DONATED MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

Medical supplies totaling \$20,000 were provided to Cross Ministries, a non-profit Christian organization that supplies missionaries around the globe.

After eight years of development, Madonna's electronic medical record (EMR) was fully implemented in 2016. Sunrise Innovations by Madonna was specifically designed and created for post-acute care providers. The system is built on a foundation of evidence-based treatment research and enhanced documentation principles meeting all regulatory compliance requirements. "Sunrise Innovations by Madonna delivers a comprehensive clinical documentation system that meets the various workflow needs of therapists, nurses, case managers and social workers involved in post-acute care settings," said Roberta Steinhauser, Madonna's director of hospital applications. "This is an outstanding accomplishment for our organization."

Recognizing the power of Sunrise Innovation by Madonna, Allscripts Healthcare Solution, Inc., entered into a content license agreement with Madonna. This partnership will allow Allscripts' clients nationally to access Madonna's comprehensive post-acute care patient evaluation and documentation system via subscription.

Madonna's clinical staff members who were instrumental in content development, along with Allscripts representatives, are working with facilities across the country to promote Sunrise Innovations by Madonna.

MADONNA ICARE by Sports/Art

Relearning to walk and remain physically active are important rehabilitation goals for individuals with weakness, numbness or balance issues, and those recovering from a disabling injury or illness. To regain walking ability, thousands of step-like movements are required to achieve lasting neuroplasticity gains. Often these individuals face barriers due to the lack of equipment that appropriately accommodates the needs of compromised muscles. Enter ICARE™.


Developed at the Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals and Research Institute in Lincoln, Nebraska, the ICARE is a fully-integrated system that provides a safe, effective method to assist patients with neuromuscular disorders that result from stroke, traumatic brain injury, partial spinal cord injury and other injuries or diseases. ICARE's intelligent control provides a movement that challenges the body with assistance and resistance. It is designed to provide an "assist as needed" approach that is similar to what a therapist provides physically and intuitively while gait training a patient.

The Madonna ICARE is sold to rehabilitation hospitals around the world and can be found in the United States, Canada, South America and Australia.






Madonna Foundation—supporting the future of rehabilitation



Madonna board member Kevin Werts recalled the joy his son, Blake, felt after receiving an all-terrain wheelchair (pictured with his family, including Blake, wife, Peggy, and son, Bryce). That's why Kevin helped launch Madonna's First Hope Patient Equipment Fund in 2012 with a \$100,000 gift from Cabela's CLUB. To date, the fund has granted 92 requests totaling nearly \$90,000. "Cabela's CLUB understands that some families may not have the means to acquire the tools they need to simplify the life of their loved ones with disabilities. It is gratifying for Cabela's CLUB to see the benefits of this program," said Kevin.

Thanks to generous donors to the Brain Initiative, the Madonna Foundation raised \$2.1 million to expand technology and research. The Armeo®, an exoskeleton with integrated springs, is one example of the cutting-edge technology that helps patients like Taylor Graham (pictured at right). After enduring a paralyzing injury in a motorcycle accident, Taylor has rebuilt his life. He is now married, graduated from college and competes on the Madonna MatchPoint Wheelchair tennis team.

The Madonna Research Institute for Rehabilitation Science and Engineering's groundbreaking research brings new and exciting technologies and treatment approaches to our patients. These efforts are a vital extension of Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals' mission—to equip those who have sustained injuries or disabling conditions with the necessary tools so they can resume activities that give their lives meaning. Work done by the research team in the past year has influenced patient care at Madonna and has advanced the field of rehabilitation sciences nationally and internationally.

Judith Burnfield, PT, Ph.D., and the Movement and Neurosciences Center of Excellence team helped children with physical disabilities and chronic conditions improve their walking and fitness through an intensive training program on the Pedi-CARE. The team developed the technology with the National Institute on Disability, Independent Living and Rehabilitation Research funding. The patented adult ICARE technology is being used in rehabilitation, medical fitness and home settings across the world to improve functional independence and health following severe injuries or illnesses.


Susan Fager, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, and her team within the Communication Center of Excellence, used eye tracking technology to develop new communication software options. They partner with the Rehabilitation Engineering Research Center on Augmentative and Alternative Communication funded through the National Institute on Independent Living and Rehabilitation Research. The results restored communication for individuals unable to talk due to conditions such as severe strokes or head injuries.

Chase Pfeifer, Ph.D., and the Rehabilitation Engineering Center of Excellence team, collaborated with clinicians and other Institute researchers to generate novel solutions that promoted greater independence of patients rehabilitating at Madonna. Technology innovations, bridging the domains of mechanical and material engineering, electrical engineering and computer sciences, enabled individuals with limited movement ability to communicate their needs with clinical staff, control their environment, and engage in recreational activities such as use of computerized gaming technology.



EMPLOYEE SAFETY

Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals successfully advanced employee safety this year and has exceeded its goal to expand and enhance the service standard of safety. Madonna's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) reportable injury rate is 4.6 which remains well below the 2014 national rate of 7.4 for similar post-acute care facilities. Madonna's overall OSHA injury rate has been below the national rate every year for the past 11 years.

EMPLOYEE DEDICATION

Severe seizures left 6-year-old Nate Venne unable to move like other children his age. He couldn't hold his head up and needed to be pushed in a wheelchair. The transdisciplinary team led by Adam Kafka, M.D., a pediatric physiatrist, worked hard to get Nate on the path to success. He relearned how to walk, talk, eat and even see again. Through daily therapy and hard work, he grew stronger and developed special bonds with his care staff. "They love him. They treat him great and that's always nice to see when it's your child," said Beth Venne, Nate's mother.

EMPLOYEE INNOVATION

Maddox, born premature, relied on a ventilator for breathing as she worked on her developmental milestones in the Madonna TherapyPlus outpatient program. The amount of medical equipment accompanying the toddler was mind-boggling. Tara Luetkenhaus, physical therapist, asked Mel Tucker, Madonna carpenter and a Nebraska Hospital Association Caring Kind award recipient, for help. Mel's handiwork produced an adorable wheeled cart with storage. The handles adjusted as Maddox grew. More importantly, her mobility increased dramatically. Today, Maddox walks independently. "It was fun to create something special to help in a patient's recovery," said Mel.



Those who sustain a serious injury or illness are frequently sent to trauma hospitals to stabilize their medical condition. However, the journey to full recovery doesn't stop following discharge from the trauma center.

To regain their highest possible level of independence and resume activities that give their lives meaning, most individuals benefit from intensive specialized rehabilitation.

Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals offer a full continuum of rehabilitation services customized to the unique medical, rehabilitative and personal needs of each patient. Madonna's capacity to seamlessly integrate services across different specialty programs and levels of care is just one reason why patients select Madonna as their provider of choice following a serious injury or illness.

Medically fragile individuals with clinically complex problems, including stroke and brain injury, can receive extended medical and rehabilitative care in Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty Hospital (MRSH), a licensed long-term care hospital available at both Lincoln and Omaha campuses.

"Madonna is quickly becoming a well-known rehabilitation hospital in Omaha and the surrounding areas," said Susan Ohnoutka, M.D., MRSH Omaha medical director and staff hospitalist.

MRSH maximizes the patient's recovery and insurance benefits to ensure individuals are medically able to tolerate the more intense acute rehabilitation phase of their recovery.

Madonna offers intensive transdisciplinary inpatient rehabilitation for individuals recovering from serious injuries

and illnesses. Each day, certified rehabilitation nurses and licensed therapists provide inpatients with specialized treatments and more than three hours of physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, psychology and/or recreational therapy to help restore independence.

Patients often return to Madonna's Rehabilitation Day Program, which focuses on community reintegration, wellness training, and life skills acquisition. Also a transdisciplinary program, it delivers three to five hours of therapy per day, three to five days a week.

"Using an in-house hospitalist team allows us to respond to patient needs and the ever-changing healthcare environment," said Tom Stalder, M.D., Madonna Rehabilitation Hospitals' vice president of Medical Affairs and chief medical officer.

Patients may then transition into Madonna's Outpatient Program or return to their home community for outpatient services. Patients receive physical therapy, occupational therapy and/or speech therapy one to three times per week.

Following formal rehabilitation, patients are encouraged to return to Madonna's Specialty Clinics and then annually for a comprehensive assessment.

"Our relationships with the University of Nebraska Medical Center and Children's Hospital & Medical Center position us to be the center of rehabilitative excellence for children and adults," said Samuel Bierner, M.D., MRH Omaha Medical Director. "It's an exciting time for all disciplines to be part of the Madonna team!"
